

## "Light of the World" - John 7:40-8:30 Word Wednesday #42 - May 15-22, 2024 Background videos, notes & extras at: cbcbonham.org/discipleship



It is noteworthy that Jesus spoke John 8:12 in the Woman's Court. The Women's Court was a large enclosed courtyard on the eastern side of the Temple proper. Only Israelites, both men and women, could enter it and Gentiles were prohibited. On the western side of this court were fifteen steps leading up to the doors of the Nicanor Gate that led into the Court of Israelites that only men could enter. Beyond that was the Temple proper with its outer courtyard that only priests could enter. So, the Woman's Court was the place where all Jews could gather, both men and women. Consequently, much activity happened in this courtyard. During Sukkot the Levites assembled on the fifteen steps to play their instruments and sing Psalms as the men danced in the courtyard waving their lulavs and etrogs in worship of Yahweh. The women watched from the balconies above the courtyard. Four tall large candelabra were set up in the courtyard to illuminate the festivities during the nights of Sukkot. These brought the light of the menorah that stood inside the Holy Place out into the world. It was the perfect setting, therefore, for Jesus to allude to himself as the light of the world. This is the second "I am" saying in the Gospel. It parallels the Prologue where John wrote of Jesus, saying, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being is life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it." (John 1:1-5) From the Jewish perspective, the light that shines into the world is the light of the Torah, symbolized by the menorah. King David spoke of such illumination by the Torah when he exclaimed, "Your word is a lamp unto my feet and a light unto my path." (Psalm 119:105)

  - What does Jesus mean by, "I am not judging anyone"?
  - List all the reasons you can believe Jesus is trustworthy.
- His Father John 8:19-30
  - Would others say your life is marked by self-sacrifice?
  - How does the Christian worldview differ from the world's in its understanding of self-sacrifice?
  - Who is the ultimate authority in your life? Do your deeds match your words? If not, what is keeping you from submitting fully to Him?
- What do you want to remember and apply from this lesson?

  - Seek His will for our church, our community, and our society.
